CHANGING THE NARRATIVE AT THE AFRICA CENTRE





On January 11th - 12th, MBC held our largest event to date at <u>The Africa Centre</u> in London; <u>Changing the Narrative</u>. Over the course of two days, over 250 people joined us for a range of panels exploring topics central to our work. These included:

- Archives, Libraries and Collections with artists, archivists, curators and human rights activists discussing the power of information, access and display
- Repatration exploring the legal, practice and very huamn aspect of restituting objects and documents
- Reparations with a very special guest, Governor Chepkwony, who joined us all the way from Kericho County Kenya, where he is currently leading an active reparations case
- <u>Decolonisation</u> with a range of dynamic insights from academics and journalists actively
 working on issues relating to decolonisation
- Africa UK Collaborations with contributions from two of our own team members, the
 British Council and the Royal Africa Society.

The whole MBC team was very grateful and touched that so many incredible individuals - on the panels and in the audience - took the time to join us and contribute their insights, energy and expertise. We know from the feedback forms (!!) that everyone who came was really inspired and motivated by the entire event and are looking forward to many more..

As MBC is also committed to sharing our work as widely as possible, we will be making all these panels available online (those with links are the ones we have uploaded - the others will follow!).





We were also very excited that <u>The Africa Centre</u> was able to host to the <u>very first exhibition</u> of our work on the Mau Mau Emergency in Kenya. The exhibition was split into three sections:

- Emergency Sites, presenting our initial fieldwork at two former works camps operated by the
 British Colonial Administration in the 1950s
- Emergency Stories, presenting three oral histories of elderly Mau Mau veterans who fought for independence from the British;
- 3D Digital Reconstructions of former detention camps developed in partnership with African
 Digital Heritage, utilising our initial fieldwork and archival records.


